We'll have great fun on Christmas Day opening countless presents and normally, as Christmas is so busy for us, the opening continues beyond the afternoon and into the evening. I'm convinced we should have shares in Amazon the number of deliveries that come our way!

Originally Christmas presents were a symbol of the greatest present of all, Jesus Christ, who God gave to the world at Christmastide. He can actually give us new life on earth and in heaven and importantly peace in our hearts.

Both of us have all we really need. I'm constantly asked by family what do you want for Christmas? No doubt there will be the Christmas jumper, regulatory smellies and of course socks and maybe, if I'm lucky, a Cricket book which I can bury my head into on Boxing Day, although there will be Ashes cricket too!

I've always advocated Crisis at Christmas and encouraged my family to make donations there rather than buy me something I don't really need. £29.80 enables a homeless person to stay in a special Christmas Shelter. It enables them to have a proper Christmas Dinner and gives access to medical help including doctors, dentists and chiropodists and advice on housing options. Simon's story rings true to me:

"After caring for his mum for years, Simon was evicted from the house when she sadly passed away. With no family, Simon ended up sleeping on the streets, spending days in the local library or riding buses to stay dry and warm. He lost all hope and was having suicidal thoughts especially as the cold drew in. You don't get to dream sleeping on concrete Simon told us. Coming to Crisis at Christmas, Simon met some of the first people to care about him since his mum. His lead worker was kind and compassionate. He helped Simon get new glasses and a mobile phone, take up woodworking and get the bereavement support he needed. With his help, Simon moved into his new flat and now spends Christmases decorating with ornaments he created himself."

Perhaps this Christmas you could reach out to people like this or encourage others to do so on your behalf?

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Church Diary in the Benefice of Trelawny

St. Wyllow Lanteglos; St. Saviour Polruan; St. Ildierna Lansallos; St. Tallanus Talland;

What different styles of service will you find in the seven churches of Trelawny Benefice?

Everyone is welcome, and all our services and teaching are based on the Bible. There's usually tea, coffee and biscuits afterwards, with time to chat.

Please come along and discover what kind of service you like best.

Lansallos (St Ildierna): all services follow the ancient and beautiful words of the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, apart from a monthly contemporary service.

Lanreath (St Marnarch): evangelical services, with some led by the Lanreath Music Group (musical instruments and choir).

Pelynt (St Nun): traditional village church Holy Communion or Service of the Word, in contemporary language, together with a monthly contemporary service, sometimes outdoors.

Talland (St Tallanus): traditional village church Holy Communion or Holy Communion-by-extension services, in contemporary language.

Lanteglos-by-Fowey parish: has three churches:

Parish Church of St Wyllow: traditional services with organist and Lanteglos Choir. Holy Communion in contemporary language, and occasional Evensong with the 1662 Book of Common Prayer.

Polruan (St Saviour): friendly Café Church once a month, with round tables, prayers, singing, Bible readings and a chance to talk.

Bodinnick (St John): community services every other month, based around major Christian festivals and usually with wine and nibbles.

Outdoor services: held in the open air on village greens, farms and quaysides — they are family friendly and great fun. 'Church on the Quay' in Polruan runs on six weekends in late July and August. Other services dotted around the Benefice include Plough Sunday, Rogation, Harvest, Tractors, Pets, Equestrian and Lambing.

A personal view from John Feeseay


Smuggling

Do you, like me at one time, suppose that the lurid stories of smuggling in 18th and 19th century Cornwall are largely mythical, perhaps exaggerated by the tourist industry to help sell more holidays? If so, think again! The British government was faced with the huge cost of having to pay for wars such as the American revolution (now called the War of Independence) and the Napoleonic Wars, so had little choice but to levy increasing duties on many goods, and especially on 'luxury' items such as brandy, rum, salt and tea. These taxes affected all areas of the country, but the Cornish economy was hit especially hard as our fishermen had to buy large quantities of high quality salt to use as a preservative for the pilchards which were one of Cornwall's most important exports. The salt was imported from France or Spain and was taxed by Customs and Excise at a rate that was up to forty times that previously charged.

Forced by hunger – and an independent nature(!) – Cornish fishermen turned to smuggling and this 'free trading' formed a major part of the local economy. As the war with France intensified, smuggling grew to be a serious drain on the country's economy and counter-smuggling measures became ever more serious – and even draconian, as shown by the grave in Lansallos churchyard of a likely smuggler killed by a cannonball, probably fired from a Customs cutter. Even so these measures were no match for cunning Cornish smugglers. Zephaniah Job of Polperro (buried in Lansallos graveyard) acted as banker to the free traders and even issued his own banknotes. Additionally, due to the support, sympathy and active collusion of whole communities, it was said that no Cornish jury would ever find a smuggler guilty!

Christingle Sunday, 14 December at 4pm

Imagine a darkened church gradually coming alive with the warm glow of candlelight, each flame representing the light of Christ in the world. This is the magic of a Christingle service, a beautiful Christmas tradition that combines meaningful symbolism with hands-on participation for people of all ages. At the heart of this service is the Christingle itself – a simple yet profound symbol made from an



orange, a candle, a red ribbon, and some sweets. Each element tells part of the Christmas story: the orange represents our world, the candle stands for Jesus as the light of the world, and the red ribbon symbolises Christ's love encircling the globe. It's a tangible way to connect with the deeper meaning of the season, but also great fun especially for children. Every child (and adult if there are enough to go round) will be given a Christingle which can be taken home afterwards, so do come and enjoy this very special service.

Carol Service Sunday, 21 December at 6.30pm

News from Nigeria



President Trump's threat to intervene on behalf of the beleaguered Christians in Nigeria has resulted in the media taking notice of the many terrorist attacks taking place all over Nigeria. Although the Fulani terrorists are attacking Hausas who are also Muslims and who have been their allies for over a century, contrary to what the Nigerian Government has said, the vast majority of the Fulani attacks have been on Christian Communities. Further to Kathleen and Daniel's latest update in this edition, in a prayer request sent in mid-October they wrote:

"More and more Fulani are coming into Nigeria and many are in the South too. We don't know what will happen as they and Boko Haram plan to take over Nigeria. God is in control. We ask you to pray."

Back in the early 1800's a Fulani Muslim scholar turned general, Usman dan Folio, waged Jihad (so-called 'holy war') against first the Hausa tribe who ruled a large swathe of what is now northern Nigeria and Cameroon at the time and then on a number of animistic tribes in the surrounding area who they forcibly converted to Islam. This resulted in setting up the Sokoto Caliphate which became one of the largest states in Africa in the 19th century. The [Sokoto Caliphate](#) has continued to the present day. Since the British conquest of the Caliphate in 1903, and later Nigerian independence under a constitutional government in 1960, the Caliphate's political authority has diminished. But the position still has considerable spiritual authority in present day Nigeria.

I am not alone in seeing the current Fulani attacks as being an attempt to continue and complete Usman dan Folio's jihad!

News from Polruan Academy

As the nights draw in, the leaves let go and the gales arrive from the Atlantic, school life takes on an autumnal feel. Rather than retreating inside, we add layers of clothing and embrace the weather; who doesn't like jumping in puddles?

This year, our final half term before Christmas is filled with performing arts. We have started preparations for our Christmas performances and are planning to entertain all parents/carers and villagers with our Christmas plays performed in the Village Hall on Thursday, 11 December; with the younger children performing a traditional nativity play and the older children performing a Christmas Pantomime version of Aladdin.

In addition to the Christmas plays, we have several community engagements. We have our Christmas Service at St Saviour's church on Friday, 19 December and we are inviting parents, families and prospective families to join us for a singalong around the tree at school on Thursday, 18 December at 2pm. Please look out for posters advertising the events.

In the classroom, Canute class have been finding out how toys have changed throughout times. As part of this unit of work, they will be sequencing toys on a timeline, investigating artefacts from the past, identifying how teddy bears have changed and what toys may be like in the future.

Along the journey, they will develop their historical knowledge of chronology and talk to different generations about toys from their childhood.

The children in Tregagle class are studying where our energy comes from. In science, we are exploring electricity, electrical circuits and conductors and looking at how renewable energy produces electricity. In art, the class is making a 3D installation sculpture drawing inspired by their trip to Heligan Gardens. Our work around climate feeds into this unit with the children considering our aging school building and its capacity to adapt.

Christmas time is when we are reminded of our supportive community and this year is no exception. We received a grand total of £420 from Polruan Sunnysiders WI following their successful fundraising event 'Polruan has Talent'. Thank You!

We have been invited to sing at the Polruan social committee's Christmas Lunch on 9 December, and our lovely Open the Book team will provide the children with a Christmas Experience following our Christmas service on Friday, 19.

Finally, we have used funds raised by parents from the Russell Inn Quiz night to take all the children to Hall for Cornwall to watch Aladdin.

Christmas biscuits

Ingredients

- 200g unsalted butter, softened
- 280g caster sugar
- 1 large egg
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 400g plain flour
- For decoration:
- Icing sugar
- Water
- Food colouring
- Sprinkles and edible glitter

Step 1: Make the dough

Preheat the oven to 190°C/170°C fan/Gas 5.

Cream the softened butter and sugar together in a large bowl until pale, light, and fluffy.

Beat in the egg and vanilla extract, a little at a time, until fully combined.

Stir in the flour until the mixture comes together to form a soft dough.

Flatten the dough into a disc, wrap it in cling film, and chill for at least 30 minutes.

Step 2: Cut and bake the biscuits

Lightly flour your work surface and roll the chilled dough to about 5mm (¼ inch) thick

Use Christmas-themed cutters to cut out shapes like stars, trees, and snowmen



Carefully place the shapes onto a baking tray lined with baking paper.

Bake for 8-10 minutes, or until the edges are just starting to turn golden brown.

Leave the biscuits to cool on the tray for 5 minutes before transferring them to a wire rack to cool completely.

Step 3: Decorate the biscuits

Once the biscuits are completely cool, mix icing sugar with a little water to create a thick icing. Add food colouring to make festive colours.

Spread the icing onto the biscuits using a knife or a piping bag.

Decorate with sprinkles, edible glitter, or other edible decorations.

Allow the icing to set before serving or storing.



We recreated the photos from Mum and Dad's honeymoon, which are included.


I understand this is more important and sentimental to us, but thought it had a local historic interest too and hope your readers enjoy sharing our memories.




Betty Johnsons 1954 on Honeymoon

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The Reading Room

One of the unusual features of Polruan is our Reading Room. In the 19th and early 20th Centuries communities across the country had reading rooms that provided newspapers and other documents for their members. In our case these included Lloyds Shipping Registers and the like. Polruan's Reading Room was maintained by a committee which charged its male members a fee to cover expenses. Most reading rooms have fallen into disuse and been closed, but ours is still here.

Sometime ago the committee handed the Reading Room back to the Town Trust who decided to refurbish it and maintain it as a free facility for individual residents and visitors — they don't have to be male anymore! Besides refurbishing and decorating the room the Trust cleared out a lot of old books and newspapers and reframed the historic photographs. Lynn's hospice book sale display is still here with a fine stock of secondhand books and jigsaws. Village records, looked after by Lorraine, are now

displayed on a bookshelf presented by John Stratford earlier this year.

The room is usually open every day and is a quiet haven with a great view, where people read and work. We have lots of visitors and recently the morning unlocking was immediately followed by the entry of two enthusiastic Australian lady visitors who, clutching Helen Doe's book on the schooner, Jane Slade, were trying to track down records of their great, great (maybe another great!) grandfather who had worked on the building of that notable ship in Polruan. Besides the written records, most visitors are also impressed by the old photograph display. The room is also rented out to village organisations for meetings.

Why not call in to have a look at this unique Polruan amenity. What is the story of HMS Polruan, who were those gig rowers in 1951 and are you impressed by those sea bass being brought ashore to be weighed and photographed? The answers to these and other local questions are in our Reading Room.



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

John Charles Ralph Nuttall-Smith; 1938 – 2025

John Nuttall-Smith passed away in London on 30 September 2025 aged 87. He is survived by his wife, Sue, children Simon and Caroline and grandchildren, Emma, Jasmine, Wendy and Ben.

Many of this Parish will remember John, who made Polruan his home with his wife, Sue, following retirement in his 50s from a career with the Observer newspaper and life in Blackheath, London. They moved to the village in January 1993 and stayed over 30 years at their home, Withyfield on St Saviour's Hill. In February 2024 they returned to Blackheath, to be closer to family as well as the health and care facilities John needed in the last two years of life.

During his time in Polruan John was an active member of the local community and church, helping publish the Lanteglos News (to later become the Parish News) from 1994 for over 20 years. He used his significant advertising and publishing experience to support the Vicar and the gifted editors to enhance and shape the publication, representing a national beacon for parish magazines today.

He was also an active member of the local RNLI and committee member, supporting fund raising events with afternoon teas at Headland and Pig Roasts on the Quay. During the late 90s John used his artistic leaning to good effect with roles in the annual productions put on by the Polruan Theatre Club.


Life in Polruan enabled John to indulge in his passion for sailing where he had a mooring for most of his time in the village. He enjoyed nothing more than a good sail in his Cornish Shrimper, messing around in the harbour and the occasional trip with family or friends up river with a flask of tea or bottle of fizz.

John was a fervent gardener with much of his spare time spent nurturing the garden through rain or shine, across all seasons, potting, planting and weeding. In his later years he was ably assisted by Sam Lamy.

John's children and grandchildren were frequent visitors to Polruan with many happy memories of Hall walks, coastal paths, boat trips to Lantic Bay, mackerel fishing and crabbing on the pontoon. Long days out were celebrated with John often taking over some of the cooking duties together with his home baked bread on the Aga. John and Sue have many happy memories of their life in the village, the parish community and enjoying time and raising a glass with their many friends in Polruan.

We have used her work a lot in The Parish News as we feel it is still relevant, authentic and of the place that is Polruan, just like John.

In addition to being a longstanding contributor to the community, not least through his key involvement with the Parish News over many years, John was a great outdoors man. He was a keen gardener. Whenever the weather allowed, John would be out weeding, pruning, planting and mowing in the garden; it was a pleasure to visit and admire all the colours he had created over the years.

John and Sue enjoyed being on the water as well and during the summer months, would often venture out on Katie of Polruan, a Salcombe Launch, originally purchased at the Southampton Boat Show where she was the first of her line. Her navy blue hull always looked immaculate. When John reached a certain age however, he felt it was time to part with her but to whom? While staying with us on holiday, our friend Sarah Steele, spotted Katie on her mooring and asked who owned her, so we introduced her to John. Next morning, they left the Polruan pontoon and headed out to Polridmouth Bay. By the time they had returned, Katie had a new owner and now sits proudly at the top of the Beaulieu River in Hampshire.

John was also a connoisseur of good food and wine which he generously shared with friends. Indeed, the hospitality given by John and Sue was always fun and memorable whatever the weather.

John will be greatly missed by his many friends. May he rest in peace.

A brief History of Lanteglos News (to become the Parish News)

from John Halkes (Vicar of the Parish until 2004)

In 1992 I started Lanteglos News from the Vicarage. It was a bi-monthly A3 folded sheet and it was to go into every home as a Parish Magazine. The Parochial Church Council (PCC) had agreed it was not just to be a Church newsletter (which was already in place); Lanteglos News was to be a church led gift to the whole community — not mainly Polruan centred as in the past. Graham and 'bella Tyson would come to the Vicarage to help my wife and I fold and collate (with much whisky consumed!). Graham's support as PCC Treasurer was critical to our plan as was the distribution system already in place and organised by Mary Toms.

By 1994, I had become terribly busy in the parish and diocese. Keith Charman, the Parish Clerk, tried editing but it was in the early days of IT, so the result was variable, and the PCC needed to keep editorial and financial control. I appealed for help and Lee Elston, who had a background in journalism in the States, volunteered to edit. We used John Thomlinson, a local designer, to do the layout and I liaised with the printer at Trevedda (near Highway).

Advertising paid for the whole production thanks to John Nuttall-Smith; and Marjorie Barrie, an ex-Fleet St hack, who lived a few doors down from us, was a great supplier

of copy. Together, John and Majorie made things happen.

After approximately 5 years Beth Rigg took over from Lee as editor. We no longer needed an outside designer. Beth worked one morning a week at The Vicarage as my secretary and was a whizz at computers and John Nuttall-Smith already looked after advertising, however, we all realised the magazine was expanding hugely and Beth did not have time to oversee production layout, as well as getting in copy. John and I both had MS Publisher on our computers, and he and Sue Shakerley had become good neighbours and members of the congregation. I asked him for help, and he said yes — becoming another Lanteglos Godsend!

So, before the turn of the century John Nuttall-Smith became the lynchpin of the magazine and finally, time and technology matched our needs!

I left the Vicarage in September 2004 and the magazine (still black and white) has just gone from strength to strength under John's editorship and more recently under the current editorship (including its shift to colour production!). Today it is still the glue of the Parish — and now a gift to the Benefice.

A memorable Christmas

In the early part of World War II Ken and I lived on the quay with our little daughter Janice in a three-storeyed house and with certain winds there was quite a strong down-draught. It was Christmas Day and our Christmas dinner of a precious roast chicken and pudding etc almost ready. The tree was glistening prettily and Janice was in her play pen having a real good time with her new toys (mostly hand-knitted animals and a doll made out of a black stocking and so on).

The pudding and the vegetables were bubbling away in their covered saucepans and I had just taken the dinner out of the coal heated oven when there was a sudden fierce gust of wind and down the chimney came a big fall of soot. Some landed on our chicken and potatoes, some covered our table, some reached the tree, quite a bit made Janice resemble a black-bird and Ken and myself were almost blackened as well. I'm not given to crying but when I looked around I'm afraid that was just what I did.

Ken got a bowl of warm water and cleaned up Janice and also my face, put clean clothes on Janice and got a clean blouse and coat for myself, got the pram from the outhouse and strapped Janice in it and then said quietly "Go out with Janice for a walk. Don't go to the families and spoil their Christmas Day. Come back when you've had a good walk." So off I went with the pram and I reached Lanteglos Church and back quietly crying in and out and we never met a soul. All were in their homes of course.

When we got back home Ken had cleared away all traces of the soot, cleaned himself and had all fresh cloths etc on the table. The pudding and veg hadn't been hurt because of the saucepan lids. So Ken had washed the chicken and potatoes and made fresh gravy and even had some holly in a vase in the middle of the table. There was no TV or anything like that to cheer us up, but he sat us down and served up a piping hot Christmas dinner and pudding and I thought then I would remember it for the rest of my life and so I have.

Ken was called up a month after and Janice and myself moved up to my Mother's when he went overseas and stayed with her until he came home again which, God willing, he did. I wonder how many men would have cleaned up the chicken like he did and made good gravy to go with it!

He told me after the war that many a soldier overseas with him had to smile when he described to them what was a most memorable Christmas Day and how he turned what looked like a tragedy into a happy, heartfelt occasion.

News from Frogmore Farm

Children love mud. Our little boys had a wonderful time when one hundred vehicles, vintage tractors, new tractors and lots of four-wheel drive vehicles did a charity run one Sunday. They came up the narrow road from Pont and went through the field opposite



Triggabrowne Farm. It was a really wet, foggy day which was such a shame because they wanted to take photos up at the Trig point overlooking the sea, but they couldn't even see the sea! The vehicles came through another field and into the road by Lantivet House. All the big wheels churned up the mud, all wet, deep and sloshy. The boys loved it, they jumped and splashed and of course managed to fall in, what fun they had. Ben had to get the yard brush and clean the road. The parade then went to Bodinnick and across the ferry to Fowey for a BBQ at Lankelly Rugby Club. I know that more than £3000 was collected.

The cattle have been brought into the sheds for the Winter. Ben sheared a strip of hair from their backs; this helps to keep the animals cool which in turn helps to prevent pneumonia. They were very happy to settle



into their Winter quarters. Lying on a deep bed of straw must be nicer than sleeping on wet muddy grass. The young bulls were put into the new shed which was built especially for them.

Our daily routine changes in the Winter. Instead of driving around the fields feeding and counting the animals every day, we are mainly working in the yards. Ben has to test the temperature of the grain every month with a long probe to be sure it isn't heating up. He keeps the records for when we are inspected for our farm assurance stickers, without which we cannot sell any grain.

The sheds have fresh straw blown in every day by a wonderful machine called a straw chopper. The same machine spreads the

silage along the feed passages; the cattle then reach through the barriers when they are hungry. The young bulls are fed ad-lib with crushed grain — it's amazing how much they eat.



The cows had a PD test to see if they were pregnant and to work out approximately when the calf will be due. Eighty-one animals were tested and eighty are pregnant. That was a nice surprise after such a long hot Summer. We were worried that it was too hot for the bulls to work!

We said a sad goodbye to our old bull, Hank. He had always been a gentle giant who loved to have his coat brushed. Bruce the young bull is not so friendly, he has been put in Hank's pen and we are hoping Sid in the next pen, will calm him down.

Simon went into the garden one night to see what was upsetting the dogs. It turned out to be two hedgehogs. Although they were very near to each other, they were not a couple. Hedgehogs lead solitary lives. It's nice to know there are still a few about.

Our cottage windows are very rotten. They were due to be replaced last year,



then this Spring and still we wait. This allows all sorts of creepy crawlies to come into the house. I put lots of woodlice, earwigs, ladybirds and spiders out each day. I read in the newspaper that if you put orange peel around the windows, spiders won't come in. I filled the rotten wood with the peel. It seemed to work.

Outside the windows, massive webs appeared. It was fascinating to see how many flies were trapped. One day a wasp was tangled in a web. The spider raced out to wrap it up and then the fight began. The wasp twisted and turned, its sting extended trying to get the spider. The spider dodged around trying to twist the web around the trapped insect with its legs. The struggle went on for ages and unfortunately, I don't know who won because I had to go out. I'm very glad the insect Matthew found on his doorstep didn't come through the window; it was a giant stick insect that seems to have lived in his garden for a few months. It's as long as his hand. He has put it in his log store



out of the wind and rain. What sort of Winter will we have? Will the stick insect survive?

Please ensure that any rubbish for collection is put out early Monday morning and not before

Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council

from Rob Rooney, Chair Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council

I like shouting about our Parish Council's successes from the rooftops and October's meeting brought news of just such a success.

Polruan Store in Fore Street is correctly recognised as crucial to the well-being of the village as a community. Lanteglos-by-Fowey Parish Council set aside £10,000 three-or-so years ago, as part of a fundraising effort when it looked like a buyer may not have been forthcoming.

Fortunately, Graham and Joanna Morris, took on the business – which includes living accommodation – and Polruan breathed a sigh of relief.

This year, Graham and Joanna applied to alter the premises internally. When the Parish Council looked at the Planning Application it seemed uncontroversial. It was a shock, therefore, to learn that Cornwall's Planning Department was recommending refusal.

In the rare instances when Cornwall's planners don't agree with us, we have a choice – go with the planners or disagree and take it to the elected members. We decided to do the latter in this instance.

Vice-chair, Gini Ainley, spoke on behalf of the Parish Council to the assembled Planning Committee Members. She was supported by local Cornwall Councillor, Jim Candy. The planning department stuck to its guns, but the members of the Committee voted in favour of the development.

The next morning, our Parish Council Clerk received the following email from Mr and Mrs Morris:

Good morning,

Could you please pass on our thanks and gratitude to the members of the Parish Council for their support and encouragement regarding

our Planning Application for Polruan Store. We sincerely appreciate the time and effort that everyone has put into this endeavour, and we wonder if it would have been granted without the overwhelming support and commitment of everyone involved.

Our October meeting brought a financial shock for councillors — a water bill for the St Saviours toilet block for July to October of £2,373.88 – the previous quarter, it was £526.48.

Naturally, we are in touch with South West Water about this. The Parish Council is aware of several other Polruan residents who have suffered similar shocks at the hands of this private monopoly. Are you in a similar position?

Members, requested a diagram showing the elevations before recording their final comments.



Summary of draft Minutes

Meeting 16 September

Attendance by 6 Councillors; Chairman - Cllr D Heard, Vice-Chairman (minutes), Cllr John Gundry.

PCSO Cocks addressed the meeting and provided crime statistics for the Parish in the previous month, as well as information for interested local groups of sources of funding for community projects.

Councillors were informed that regarding PA25/00228/PREAPP (Solar Farm) there was nothing new to report, save that it was expected that there would be a full planning application before the end of the year.

The Clerk's report was detailed (in her absence) in the meeting agenda. Those matters requiring further action were discussed and resolutions passed.

Correspondence was dealt with, and thereafter PA25/06104 was considered, Councillors resolved to support.

The 3 Councillor vacancies were discussed and the meeting resolved to raise awareness in the community. Councillors considered: a report that pedestrian access was being impeded by overgrown verges along a village street; play equipment for younger children in the Parish; the fireworks display; Local Maintenance Partnership funding; the 20-mph implementation in Lanreath village.

Reports were given regarding Assets, the Village Hall, Community Area Partnership, and Climate Change.

Parish Council finances were considered, and payments for the next two months approved.

With all agenda items having been considered the meeting closed at 21.04.

Meeting 21 October

Attendance by 5 Councillors, no members of the public, and Cllr Preece in attendance. Chairman – Cllr D Heard, Clerk – Mrs R Warren.

Cllr Preece provided a comprehensive update and responded to Councillors questions.

Councillors were advised regarding PA25/000228/PREAPP, that any full planning application was likely to be significantly different to the PREAPP, after local objection and some consultation with the community.

The Clerk reported on matters that had been actioned and thereafter the meeting briefly considered significant correspondence.

PA25/02367 was considered and the meeting resolved to support.

It was resolved that the Clerk, Chairman and Cllr Roberts would work on a draft Budget to be considered at the November meeting. The Clerk's financial report and payments for the next month were approved.

The broken light on the shop footpath to be considered at the November meeting. There being no public participation, and having considered all agenda items, the meeting concluded at 21.21.

Next meeting 18 November 6.30pm.

National Coastwatch

EYES ALONG THE COAST

from Ray Rigg

Marine activity has now reduced considerably and we have moved into winter mode; we still keep watches but team members take time to revise their training and learn more about our technology in the quiet periods. So, I thought this would be a good time to say something about the national organisation.

In 1994, in Cadgwith Bay off the Lizard in Cornwall, a fishing boat sank, and its two crew unfortunately perished. This happened soon after many Coastguard lookouts had been closed, and such was the depth of local feeling following the tragedy, the local community decided to set up a volunteer watch over that section of the coastline, and the National Coastwatch Institution was formed.

National Coastwatch has gone on to establish 60 lookout stations around England and Wales, from Fleetwood in the North West, through Wales, and around the English coastline to Filey, in the North East. More are planned, based on information supplied by our colleagues at the Maritime and Coastguard Agency (HMCG) and the RNLI, and will be established as quickly as funding permits and staff can be recruited. NCI Polruan was formed in 1998; it is station number ten and is one of 13 stations that serve Cornwall.

The organisation is a registered charity reporting to HM Coast Guard. National Coastwatch (NCI) watchkeepers provide eyes and ears along the coast, keeping watch and monitoring radio channels to provide a listening watch in poor visibility. When people find themselves in trouble, we are there to alert HM Coastguard and direct the appropriate emergency and rescue services to the casualty.

The NCI nationally has a membership of approximately 3,000 volunteers. The national office is situated in Liskeard, where there are three administrative staff, our only paid employees. Each station has to raise its own operating funds locally whilst nationally we have a number of generous sponsors.

National Activity Report — covering 1 January to 31 October 2025

October continued to see a slowdown in activities around the coastline but incidents involving the NCI tended to be of a more serious nature as weather conditions worsened. Nationally, we dealt with a total of 60 incidents in October.

So far this year NCI have initiated or supported 862 incidents across our 60 active stations, an increase of 117 or 16% on the same time last year. Through our diligence and support so far this year we have initiated



or assisted in the rescue of 284 persons and assisted 547 others. That's a total of 831 people who have benefitted from our help and vigilance; 353 incidents have required the launching of a lifeboat. NCI Polruan has had a very quiet year with only five incidents including the rescue of a missing villager.

If you are interested in joining us, please drop into the station or call Ray Rigg on 07956 286270. Training is carried out by experienced watchkeepers in the lookout station and in classroom settings. An assessment is carried out when you're ready, to check that all necessary competencies have been learned.



Polruan Coastguard

As you are reading this, winter will have fully set in! With this comes the wind, rain, floods, storms and Christmas!

For the team it has been very quiet with only 3 call outs.

From the Station log

13 September: Team paged at 13:07hrs; two persons in water, jet skis collided. Stood down on route to scene. Looe ILB towed casualties to Looe for treatment.

22 September: Team paged at 10:11hrs; Person fallen on cliff path, lower limb injuries. Team assisted Looe Coastguard Rescue Team (CRT) with extraction and treatment before family took casualty to hospital for further treatment.

29 October: Team paged at 21:43hrs; Suicidal male, Looe area. Team stood down on route. Casualty found safe with relatives.



We continue to train twice a month throughout the year, mixing up the training with knowledge and indoor training: casualty care, unexploded ordnance (UXO) and pyrotechnics, map reading etc. and outdoor skills: search, rope rescue and water rescue. But whatever the weather, training continues inside or out.

With the winter weather mentioned above, come significantly higher risks along the coastline. The strong winds, large waves and higher tides, although great to watch are highly dangerous and it is advisable to watch from a safe distance and to stay away from the edge.

The team are currently recruiting for up to three new team members, you can apply if

- You are over 18.
- You hold a full driving licence.
- You live close to the station.

Although the first two are mandatory the last one can be flexible and we would definitely be interested in potential new members from the outlying areas and villages of Lerryn, Lanreath, Pelynt and so on.

Alternatively, pop by the station if you see us training! We train on every second and last Thursday of each month.

Well seeing as I've mentioned the Christmas word, the team and I hope you all have a joyful and safe Christmas and new year!

After the busy summer months, with shouts arriving regularly, we entered a brief respite over the past two months, with only a single call-out for our local volunteer RNLI crews. On the morning of Saturday, 27 September, the volunteer crew were paged to launch to assess the condition of a sailor who had called for help while alone aboard his yacht in Fowey Harbour. The Southwest Ambulance Service had requested the launch as the casualty was reported to be unwell and deteriorating. As the crew prepared to launch, a Fowey Harbour Patrol boat brought the casualty to the lifeboat pontoon, so the launch was aborted. Instead, our crew then provided casualty care at the station while waiting for the ambulance, which arrived soon after. The ambulance crew took over the casualty for assessment. He was released later.



The local crew remain on call with the new, latest-generation, Atlantic 85 rigid inflatable lifeboat, as well as the inshore Class D vessel. The larger vessel currently in use is a temporary vessel on loan, while a brand new craft is under construction and is due to arrive in the new year, when there will be a naming ceremony and celebration. Local crew are now fully qualified on the station's new vessel.

Could you help save lives at sea as a RNLI Water Safety Volunteer? The RNLI are currently recruiting in the Fowey/St Austell area for a Water Safety Officer. You might already be involved in the RNLI, or be new to the organisation, however all applications are welcome and training will be provided. As part of the water safety team, you will play an important part in RNLI lifesaving operations, by sharing vital water safety messages, supporting or running events and helping to educate and equip water users from all spheres to enjoy the sea safely. News from the Boatyard

As the Autumn months of September and October roll by, Toms' Yard has been a hive of activity, welcoming both new and returning customers. We have been continuing with a range of exciting improvements supported by the UK Shared Prosperity Fund grant via Cornwall Council.

Our Engineering and Carpentry Workshops are now nearing completion; upgrades include insulated wall panels, new lighting, extraction systems and enhanced electrics, all complemented by the addition of various new specialist machines. The reception area and stores have also been renovated, creating a more efficient and welcoming space for both staff and visitors.

Sustainability remains central to our progress. Solar panels have been installed on several yard buildings, powering our new electric machinery and contributing to our reduced carbon emissions across the boatyard. A new remotely operated winch has also been fitted, improving both performance and safety for our slipway lifting operations. We are also eagerly awaiting the arrival of our new Mobile Vessel Trolley, which will be a valuable addition to our lifting equipment.

Looking ahead, remaining projects include the installation of a vessel wash-off system and improved staff welfare facilities. These final upgrades are scheduled for completion by the end of the year to early January.
